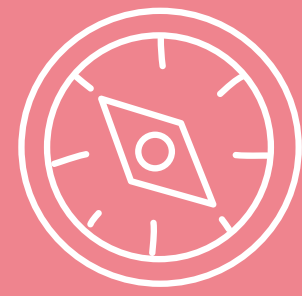

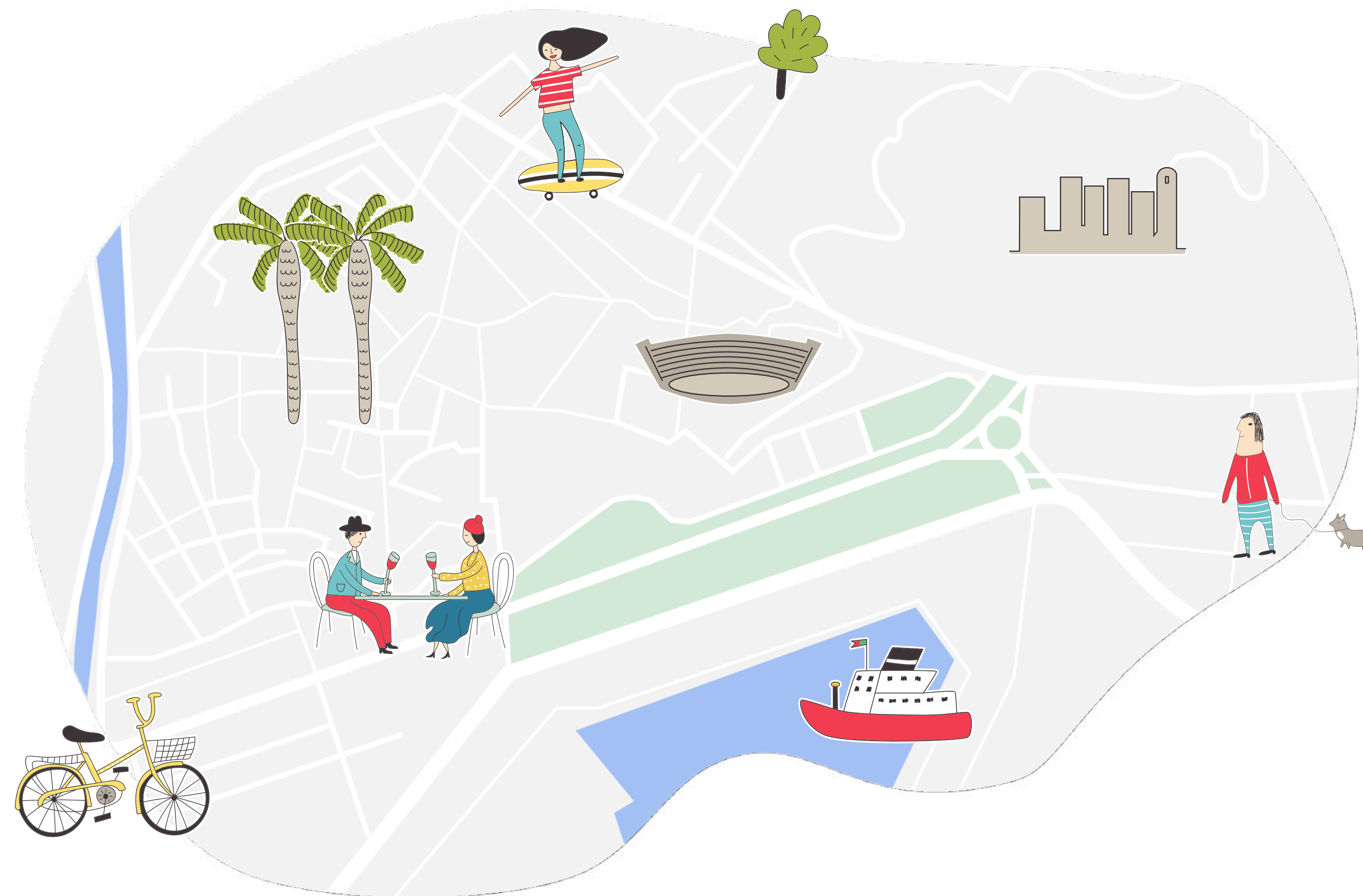




Travelling to **MALAGA** *is always a* **GOOD PLAN**

Admire views of the city from Gibralfaro. Explore its legendary Alcazaba. Stroll along Paseo del Parque admiring its centenary trees and the Palacio de la Aduana's leaning palms. Wander along the vibrant Calle Alcazabilla and its Roman Theatre or the ever lively Muelle Uno. Discover mural paintings in Soho's streets. There are so many amazing spots in Malaga you'll want to snap them all, so you'll always remember your trip to this city. Here are some of the keys to exploring this Costa del Sol jewel's more authentic side.





1. TRAVEL BACK IN TIME THROUGH THE CITY'S HISTORY

Malaga is the capital of the Costa del Sol and one of Spain's major cities, with an impressive history and an even more interesting present. Its old town, along with its lively port, has been declared a **Site of Historical and Artistic Significance and Asset of Cultural Interest**. Picasso's town is nowadays a cultural centre of reference in Europe. The following places will take you on a journey through time to discover the city's attractive past.



The Alcazaba and Gibralfaro Castle

The Alcazaba and Gibralfaro Castle are **the main legacy of Malaga's Moorish past**. These fortresses, built between the eleventh and fourteenth centuries, represent one of **the best-preserved examples in defensive architecture of the period in Spain**. The castle, dominating the top of the hill of the same name, offers fabulous views of the city and Mediterranean.

Combining defence and beauty in a single enclave, the Alcazaba has become one of the city's most iconic monuments. The union of Roman and Arab cultures, along with the extraordinary views it offers, make this place a unique, essential place to visit.

Malaga or La Encarnación Cathedral

Malaga Cathedral is one of the **richest Renaissance gems in Spain**. It was built on the site of the Great Mosque from the sixteenth to the seventeenth century. This architectural ensemble was left with one of its towers unbuilt. So the cathedral is known as **"la Manquita"**, or the "maimed" one.

Designed by Diego de Siloé, other great masters of the Andalusian Renaissance, such as Andrés de Vandelvira, Hernán Ruiz II and Diego de Vergara were also involved in its construction. Among the priceless art the church houses are the carved choir, the work of Pedro de Mena.





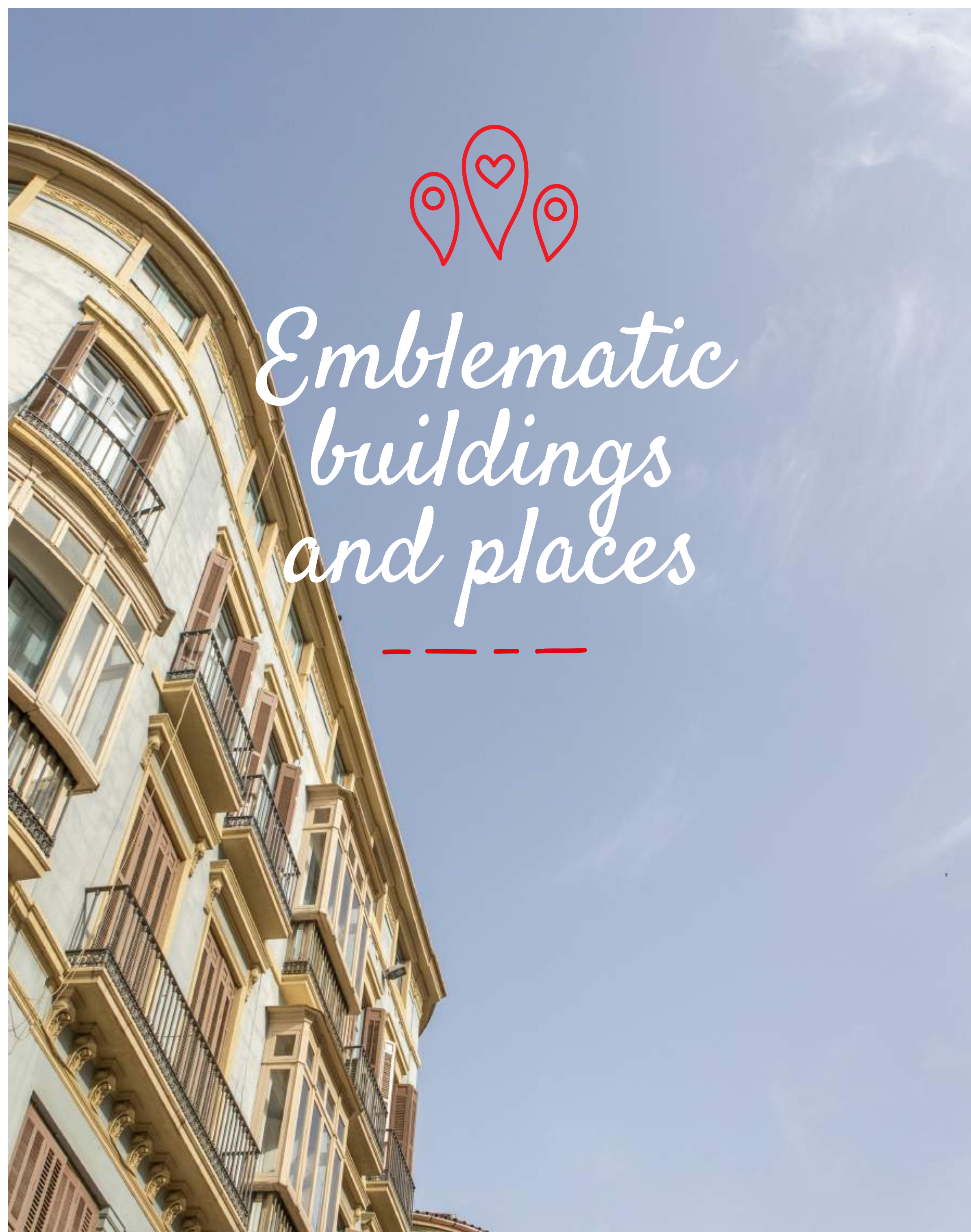

Roman Theatre!

At the foot of the Alcazaba is the Roman Theatre.

Built in the time of the Emperor Augustus, in the first century CE, on the structure of a baths, it is the main vestige of the city's Roman presence.

It also has an innovative **interpretation centre** where visitors can learn about life and customs in Roman Hispania.



Malaga has a surprising variety of nineteenth-century buildings brimming with charm, such as **Cervantes Theatre, the Palacio de la Aduana and La Malagueta Bullring**. Also from the nineteenth century are the noble houses of the **Alameda Principal, Málaga Park and the famous Calle Larios**. The latter, the city's most emblematic street, culminates in the **Plaza de la Constitución**, presided over by the Renaissance-style **Fountain of Genoa**. From here you can admire the picturesque **Pasaje de Chinitas, the Casa del Consulado and the Ateneo de Málaga**, the old school where Picasso began to draw.

Outside the city's historical heart, we find another of the most beautiful historic spaces in the city: the **Botanical-Historical Garden of La Concepción**, created around 1855. This impressive natural space houses a collection of tropical and subtropical flora with more than a thousand species from all over the world. It was declared a **Historical Artistic Garden** in 1934 and is currently considered an **Asset of Cultural Interest (BIC)**.

LOS MELLIZOS

On its menu, the ensaladilla rusa (Russian salad), changurro omelette and the manolitas (fresh sardines in season) are true classics.

RESTAURANTE LA BOUGANVILLA

Sitting in the historic centre of the city, in Plaza del Carbón, La Bouganvilla is a restaurant where you can dig into tapas and other dishes that emanate the essence of Andalusian gastronomy. The extensive menu features the dishes that best define Malaga.

CASA CARLOS

Not only is it located on one of Malaga's most famous beaches, La Malagueta, Casa Carlos is also the oldest restaurant in the area. Since 1936, Casa Carlos has specialised in traditional cuisine, delighting diners with the most delicious Andalusian dishes served in a friendly atmosphere. Callos is the star dish and the restaurant even took part in the 2nd edition of the international competition, Callos Naguar.

TABERNA UVEDOBLE

A modern tavern located in the city's heart, specialising in tapas based on traditional Mediterranean cuisine with a flair for the avant-garde. Quality products, creativity and flavour make up each dish's DNA, the most outstanding of which are its award-winning ensaladilla rusa (Russian salad), toasted fideos negros (black noodles) with squid and the mini-brioche of suckling pig with aioli made from its own juices.

RESTAURANTE KALEIDO MÁLAGA PORT

Kaleido Málaga Port is a restaurant located in the Palmeral de las Sorpresas, next to Málaga's old town. It has a terrace on which diners can enjoy spectacular views of Málaga Port. Its menu offers a wide variety of Andalusian cuisine with Mediterranean touches while its team provides its customers discreet, personalised service.

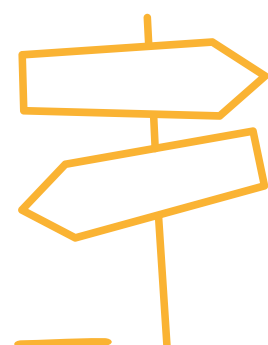

BODEGAS EL PIMPI

El Pimpi is one of Malaga's most iconic restaurants. Its essence is the typical Andalusian atmosphere and its decoration is 100% Malaga. Generations of personalities from the world of flamenco, politics and art have passed through its halls: the Picasso family, Carmen Thyssen, La Repompa, Antonio Banderas, the Duchess of Alba and many others bear witness to this bodega's history. For this reason, its dishes could only be based on the local gastronomy, fresh and seasonal products. The menu contains a wide variety of salads, Iberian cured meats, fish, seafood, meats and toast. Its suggestions include paella, 'grandma's croquettes' and salmorejo.



LO GÜENO

This small traditional tasca features delicacies from the province's interior. It is one of the oldest restaurants in the centre of Malaga, its walls decorated with paintings by well-known Malaga artists. Hams and cheeses, asparagus and seasonal vegetables, Málaga salad and broad beans with Iberian ham and naturally a wide variety of fried fish.

CASA ARANDA

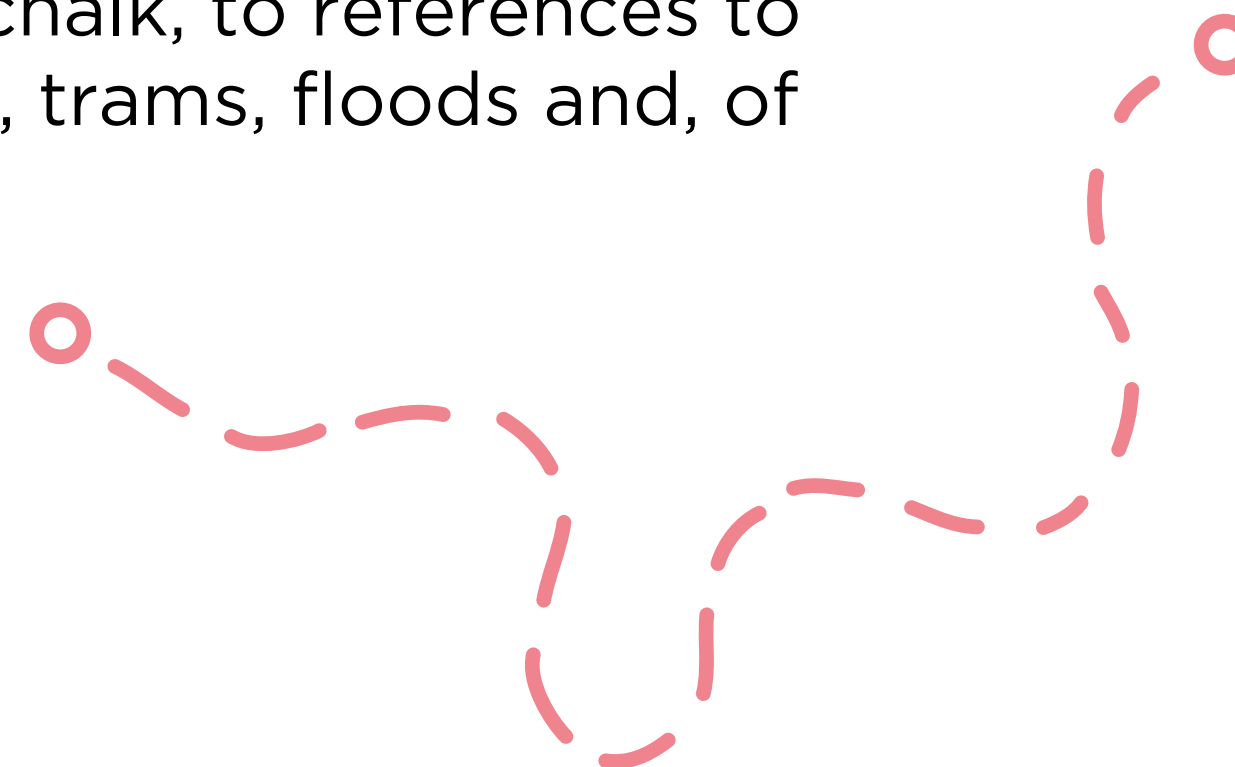

CAFÉ CENTRAL MÁLAGA

Possibly Malaga's most emblematic café. Café Central is located in the Plaza de la Constitución and is decorated in an antique style, boasting unique details. It was formerly known as Café Santa Cristina and is the oldest café in Malaga. It was here that the peculiar classification of ten different types of coffees was invented, which, nowadays, the people of Malaga can order in any bar or café in the province.






The Markets

One of the most authentic ways to get to know the people of a destination is through its markets.

These public spaces are the **essence of tradition** and a firm favourite with locals for their offer of **fresh, local, quality products**.

It is typical to **sample some delicious tapas in the bars inside the markets**, where you will find delicacies cooked in a simple way at bargain prices.

Although there are many markets in the capital, it is worth visiting **Atarazanas Market**, with its neo-Mudejar architectural style, **Huelin market** (the city's second largest) and **El Carmen Market**, in the heart of the Perchel, one of the city's oldest fishing neighbourhoods.



The wine

The province has **more than 40 wineries registered with the Regulatory Council of the Designations of Origin 'Málaga', 'Sierras de Málaga' and 'Pasas de Málaga'**: a perfect reason for wine lovers to visit. They make wines from Moscatel and Pedro Ximénez grapes with a long tradition.

One way of getting to know Málaga's wine culture is to visit the **Wine Museum**, housed in the centrally located Biedmas Palace. Here you can find everything related to the wines cultivated in the Montes de Málaga, Axarquía, Antequera, Costa Occidental and Serranía de Ronda regions.

Another fantastic option is to go directly into the vineyards to learn first-hand about these wines' production process, **discovering traditional wineries, corners and traditions** that will not leave you indifferent.



Gastronomic experiences

The **gastronomic routes** are designed for the most demanding palates, gourmets and foodies.

Day trips, tapas and wine tours, typical Spanish cooking classes or visits to traditional food markets are some of the experiences that will lead you to discover the essence of Málaga's cuisine and the Costa del Sol's gastronomic culture.

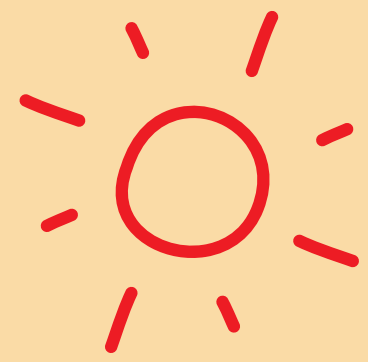

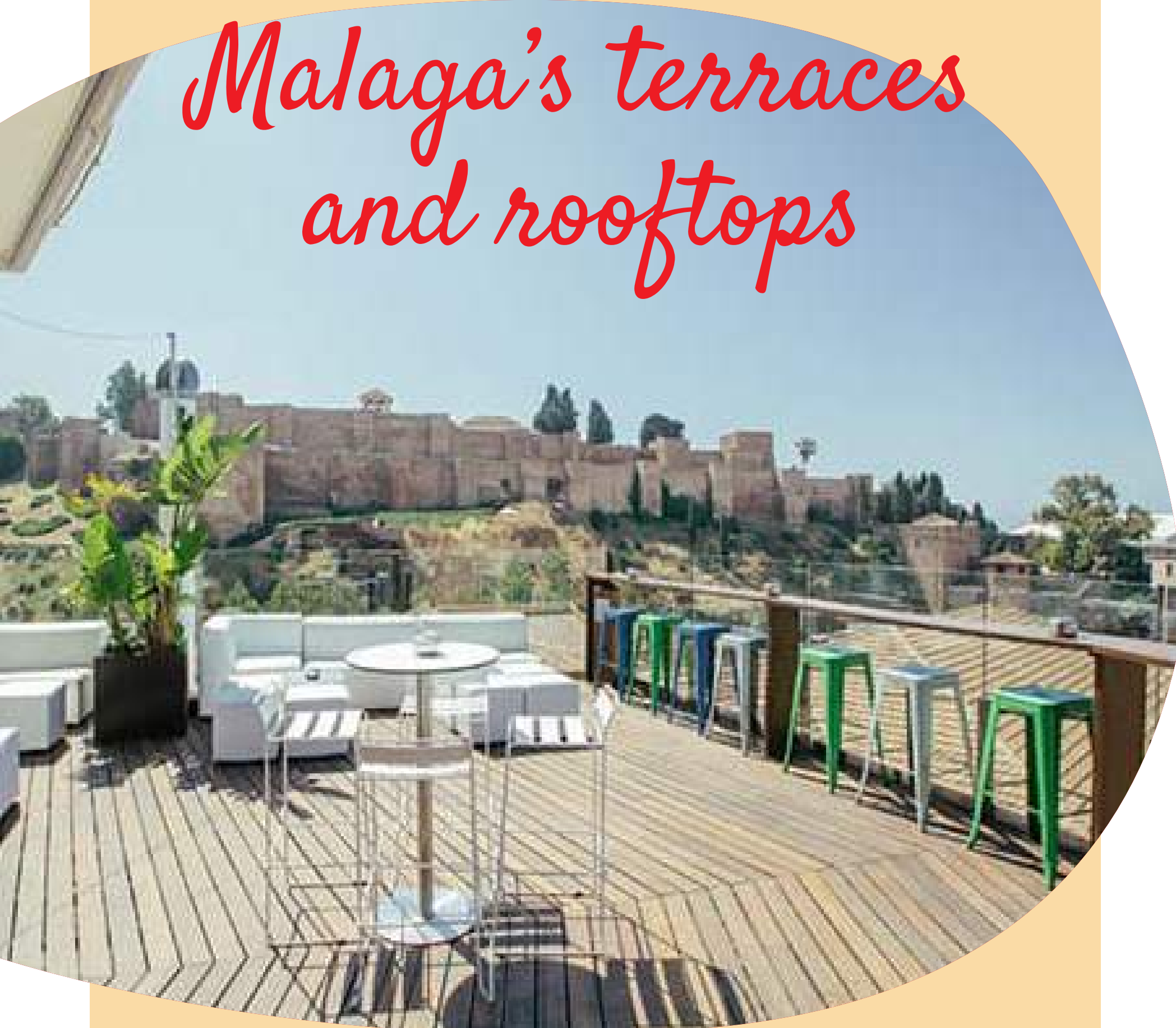

City of museums

It is estimated that Málaga has around 40 exhibition centres. We are talking about the city where Pablo Picasso was born and, as such, it has numerous cultural activities based on the figure of the painter. 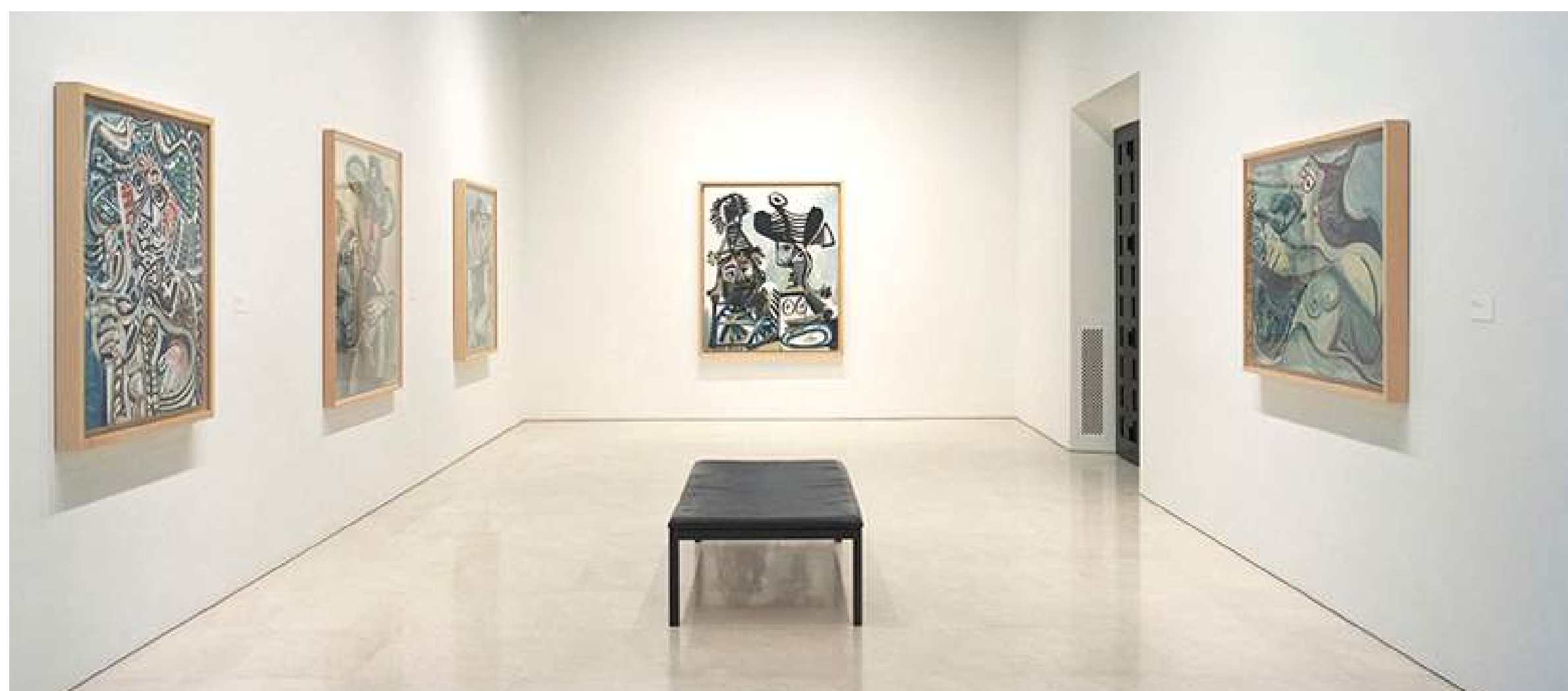


IN *Picasso's* FOOTSTEPS

The work of **Pablo Picasso** can be admired in several exhibition spaces in Malaga.

The Pablo Picasso Birthplace Museum, which houses works and personal objects of the artist and his family, and the **Picasso Museum Malaga**, which tells the story of almost eight decades of Pablo Picasso's work

The Collection of more than two hundred works, which is periodically renewed, provides a thematic and chronological overview of the artist's career.



In addition to Picasso's work, at the **Centre Pompidou Malaga** you can admire the work of **internationally renowned artists**.

The Centre Pompidou in Malaga is the first branch of the Parisian institution outside France.

It offers a **journey through the art of the twentieth and twenty-first centuries** with the most select works from one of the most important collections in the modern and contemporary world.

Carmen Thyssen Museum

Another of the most visited art galleries is the Museo Carmen Thyssen, with an interesting collection of **Andalusian art and customs**. It is located in the **Palacio de Villalón**, a sixteenth-century building in Malaga's old town. The museum's permanent collection is made up of works by nineteenth-century Spanish artists, especially Andalusian painting.

Museum of Malaga

The Museum of Málaga is the **largest museum in Andalusia and the fifth largest in Spain**. It is located in the historic **Palacio de la Aduana**, a neoclassical building built in the eighteenth century. It is worth highlighting the Fine Arts section, which has works by such important Spanish artists as **Luis de Morales, Murillo, Alonso Cano, Velázquez, Goya and Zurbarán**. The best thing about it? Admission is free for all European Union citizens.

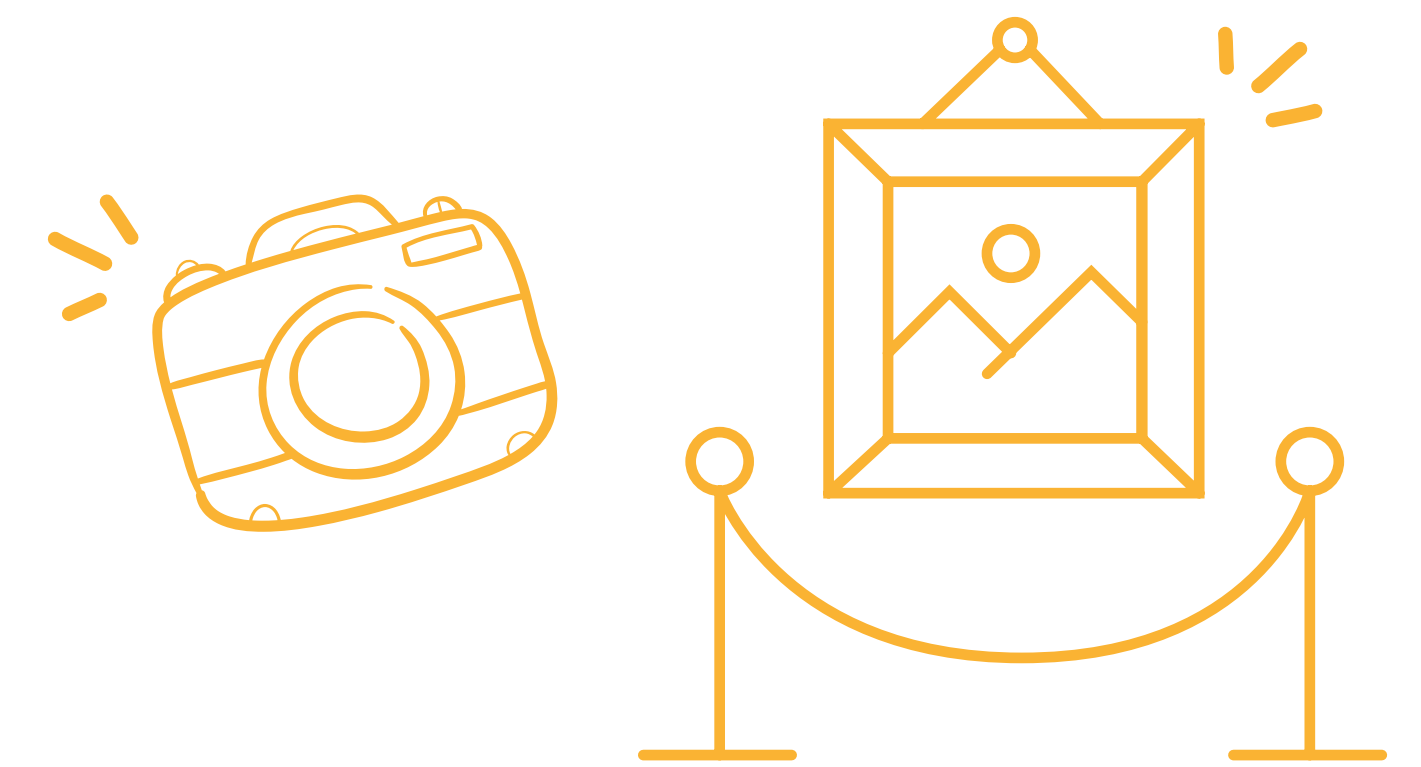

CONTEMPORARY ART CENTRE

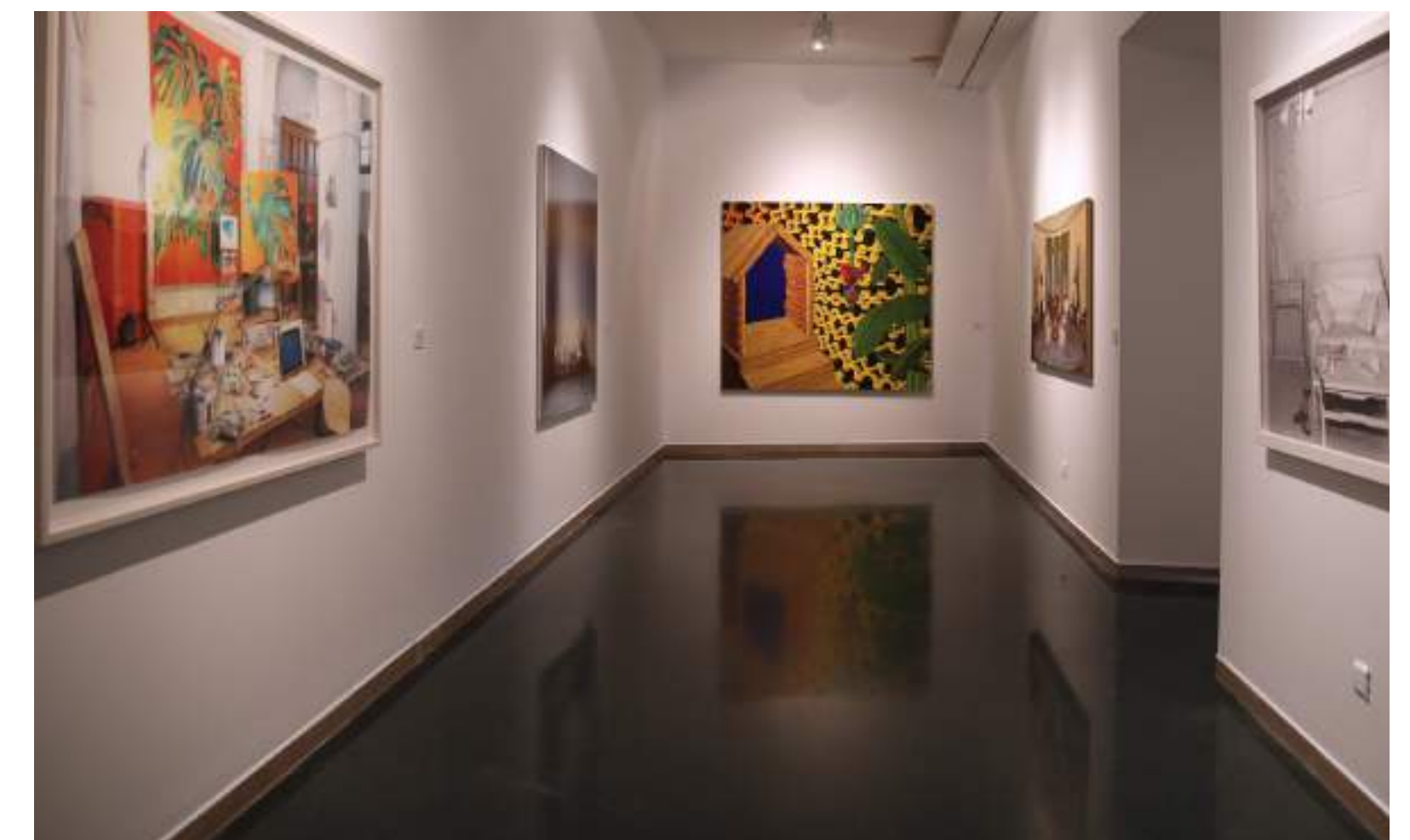
The CAC Malaga, which is free of charge, has an interesting selection of contemporary art. In addition to its permanent collection, there are various temporary exhibitions, performances and installations.

IFERGAN COLLECTION

The Ifergan Collection is a gallery specialising in archaeology that invites visitors to travel far back in time through viewing some exceptional pieces, from mythical Mesopotamia to the appearance of Islam, taking in Egypt, Greece, Rome, Persia and Byzantium along the way, including a real Egyptian mummy from the Eighteenth Dynasty.

Russian Museum of St Petersburg

This museum has become a reference point for Russian culture outside the country. Located in the Tabacalera building, it has borne witness to the **works by some great names in Russian art**: Chagall, Malevich, Kandinsky, Filonov and Goncharova among the avant-garde; and the lesser known but equally splendid Russian nineteenth century painters, Repin, Korovin, Levitan and Serov. Visitors can delve fully into this **huge country's culture and history**.

CERVANTES THEATRE

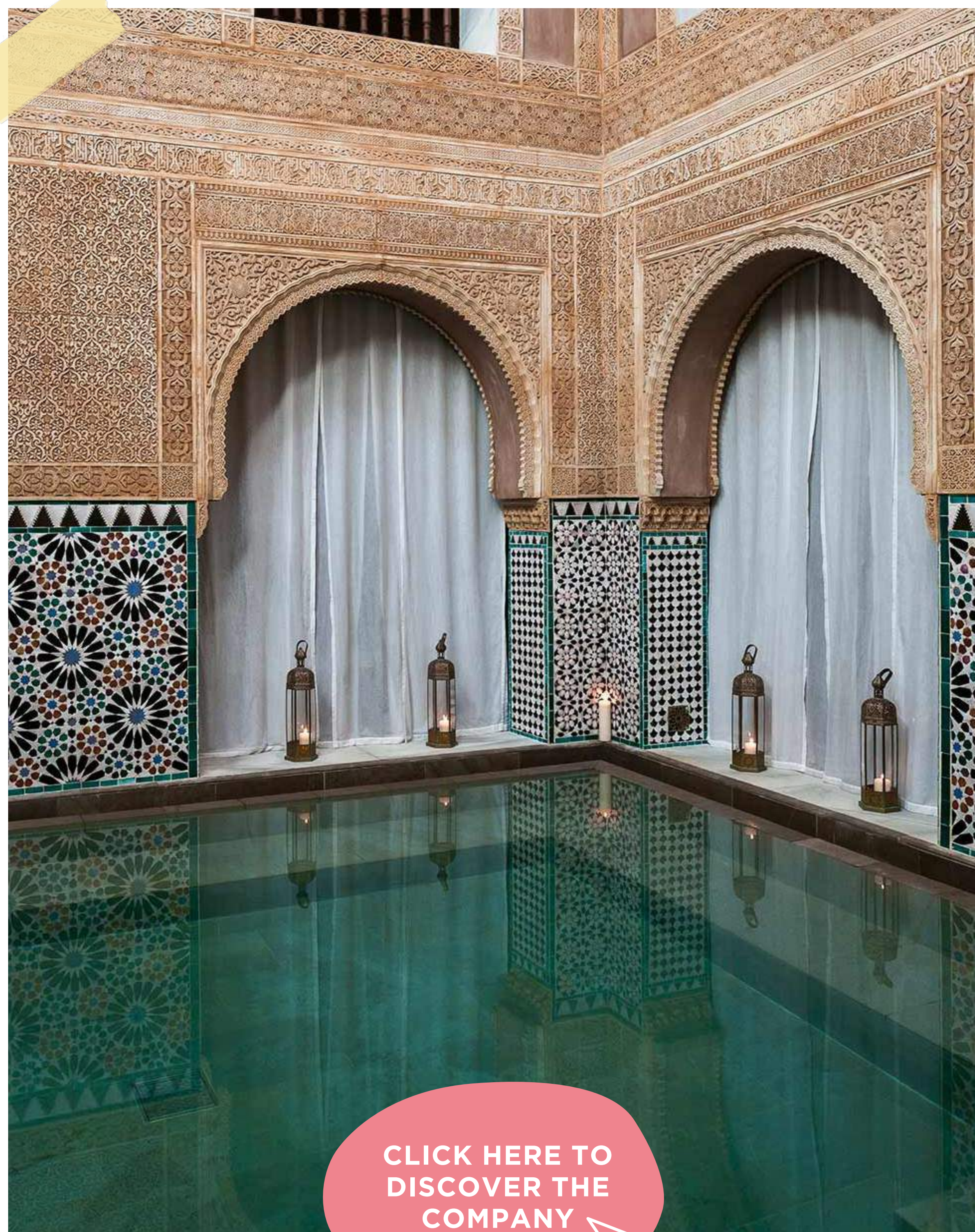
Performing arts buffs should keep an eye on the programme of the Cervantes Theatre: the city's most iconic theatre. It is characterised by the great diversity of activities it hosts. From the most classical to the latest artistic trends, they comprise an inexhaustible, truly enriching cultural offer.

ALBÉNIZ CINEMA

Its signage pays particular attention to Spanish, European, Latin American and children's films, as well as foreign films in their original version, subtitled in Spanish. However, Auditorium 1 incorporates 3D technology for the projection of more commercial films and satellite connection for the live broadcasting of operas and concerts, and is also equipped to offer theatrical performances.

ECHEGARAY THEATRE

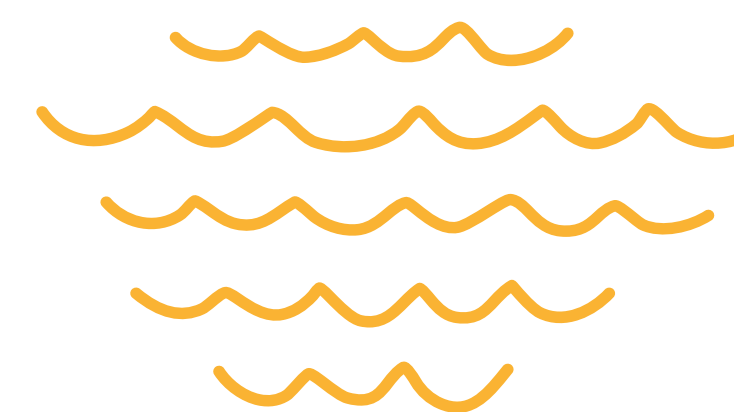
This theatre is located in Malaga's old town and offers a varied programme of theatre, dance, music and children's plays. The building first opened in 1932 as a cinema and was refurbished in 2009. After a recent refurbishment, it now has a capacity for more than 300 spectators.



Relax HAMMAM AL ANDALUS

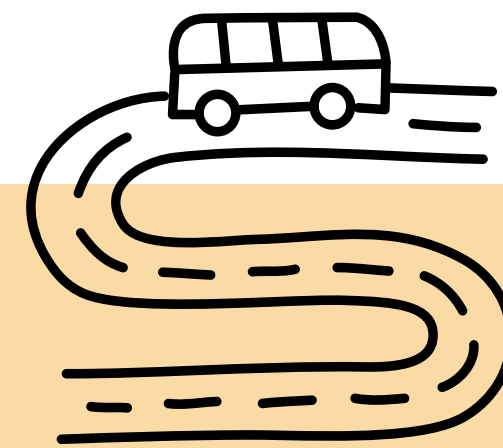
This monumental space has been recently refurbished and captures the essence of **the ancient Arab baths of Al Andalus.**

It is made up of five thermal baths with water at different temperatures, steam, rest and massage rooms, forming an architectural ensemble with beautiful Nasrid decoration that invites you to relax your mind and body.

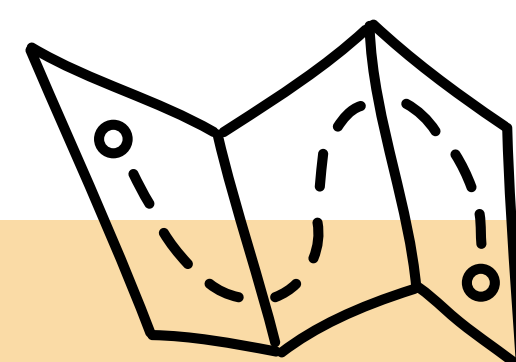

4. STROLLING *around Malaga :* NEIGHBOURHOODS *to get lost in*

The old town of Malaga is full of monuments and streets where wandering around becomes an authentic experience for all the senses. Churches, convents and palaces of great cultural and artistic value make up this group of streets, most of them pedestrianised and in Arabic style. The atmosphere on the terraces of bars and restaurants will grab your attention. The famous Calle Larios is old town's central axis and most streets lead off here. It forms the core of the neighbourhood's social activity and is also a commercial and economic reference point. Pedestrianised, it has renowned and popular clothing and decoration shops, so, as well as admiring the traces of the city's past, it is the ideal place to enjoy a pleasant day of shopping and leisure.





Muelle Uno

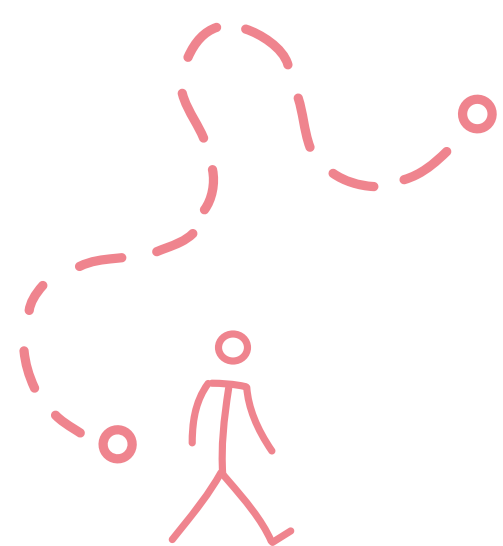
This space opened in the Port of Malaga in 2011. Dedicated to leisure and culture, it has become an emblem of the city. It has the best views for discovering and enjoying the capital's essence. It is a shopping area and open space with a wide offer of shops and restaurants. Muelle Uno also hosts all kinds of concerts and cultural events for all ages.



La Malagueta

Between nineteenth-century constructions, trees and tall buildings, there is a very unique corner of Malaga. This is the district of La Malagueta, located next to Pier One down at the port and girded by the beach of the same name. An excellent spot that is a great alternative for getting to know the capital of the Costa del Sol in depth, enjoying a pleasant day at the beach and, of course, its many culinary options looking onto the Mediterranean.





El Soho: neighbourhood of the arts

Just a few minutes from the María Zambrano train station and the centre of Malaga, you have Soho, an emerging neighbourhood between the Muelle Heredia and the Alameda. It is known as “the neighbourhood of the arts” and is mainly dedicated to urban art, museums and creative cuisine. Its numerous cultural and leisure activities make this neighbourhood a must-do for any urbanite visiting Malaga capital.



Pedregalejo and El Palo: fishing neighbourhoods

To the east of the city lie Pedregalejo and El Palo: two traditional fishing neighbourhoods, whose roots stretch back to the late eighteenth century. The richness of the area’s waters attracted hundreds of seines from the surrounding area, mainly dedicated to catching anchovies and sardines. There are still vestiges of this area’s popular dwellings, many of which have been transformed into beach picnic areas. Pedregalejo and El Palo are today two of the city’s main residential neighbourhoods, and one of the favourite areas for locals to enjoy the famous “pescaíto frito” (fried fish) on the beach.

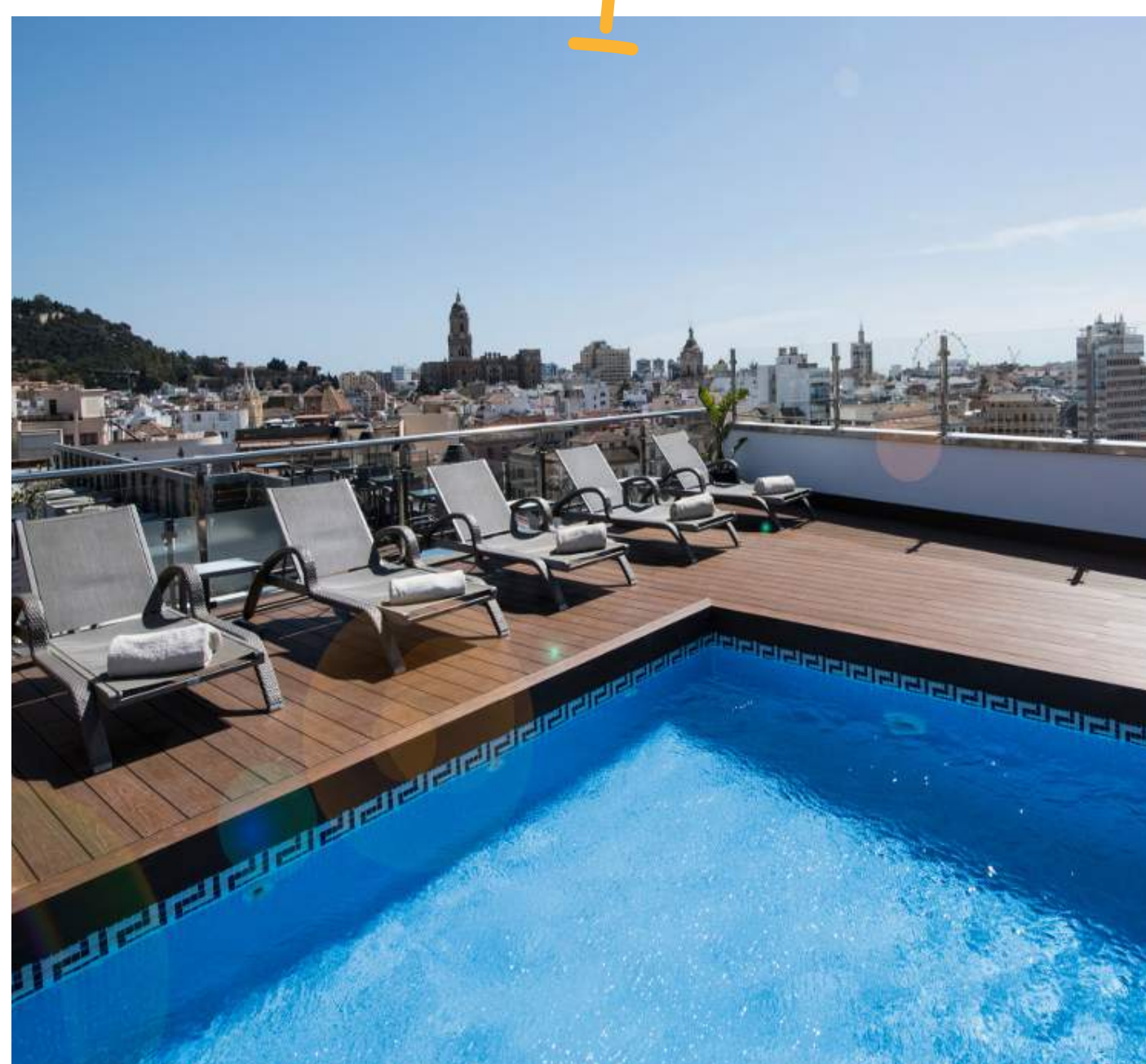

HOTEL SALLÉS MÁLAGA CENTRO****

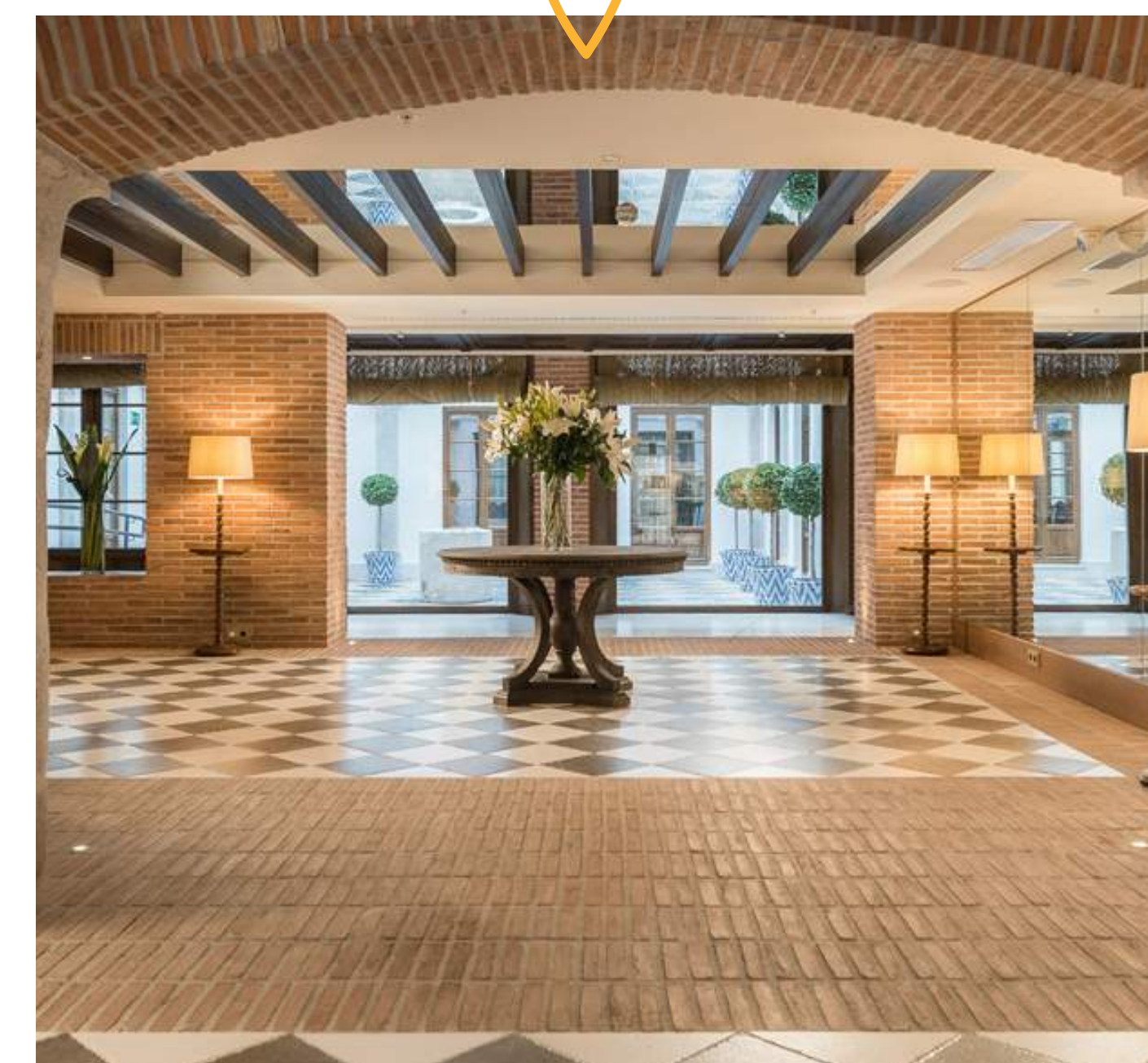


PETIT PALACE PLAZA****

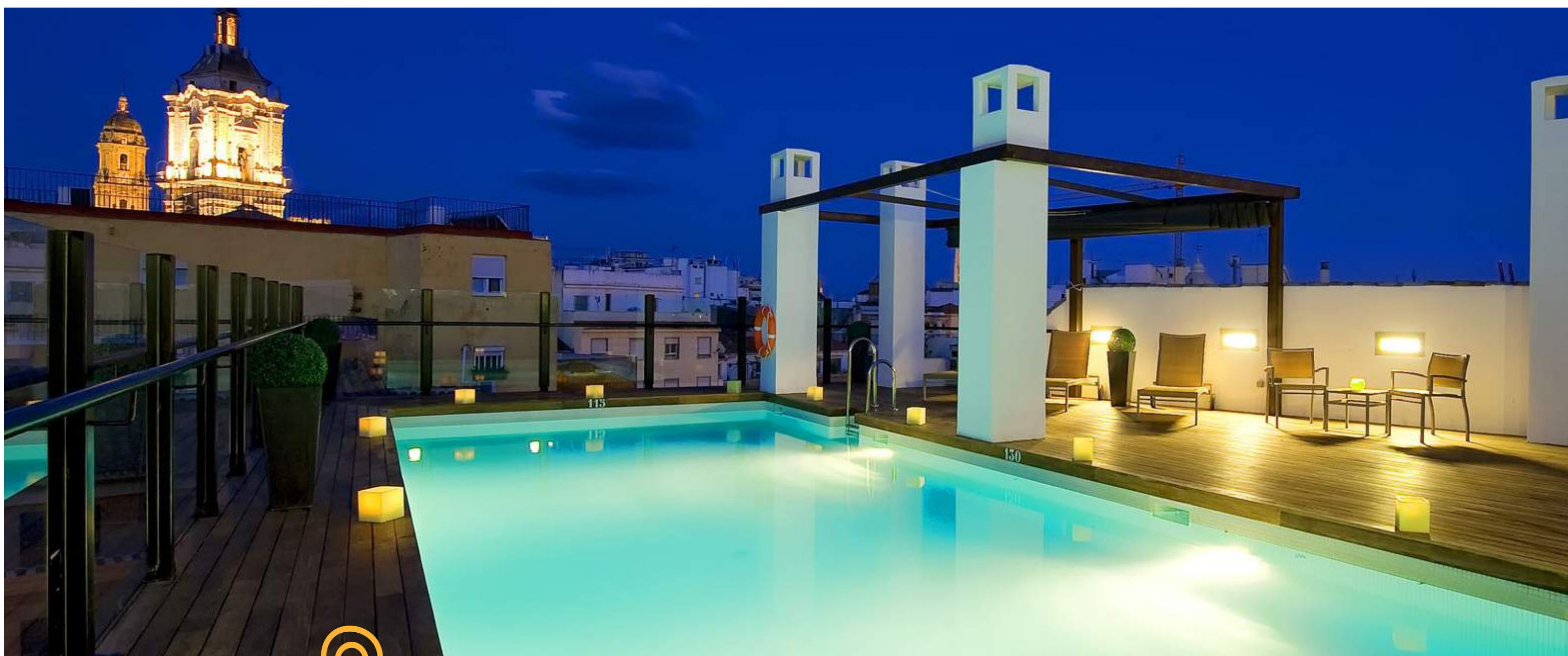
This hotel is housed in a twentieth-century mansion and offers modern, cosy rooms just 100 metres from the centre of Málaga. Its large windows allow guests to enjoy views of the city centre. Guests can enjoy a continental breakfast in the hotel's traditional Andalusian courtyard.

PALACIO DE SOLECIO****

Palacio Solecio, a Small Luxury Hotel of the World, is located just 400 metres from the centre, in an eighteenth-century palace, renovated yet faithful to the period style. Its Balausta restaurant is run by José Carlos García, the city's renowned Michelin-starred chef.

HOTEL VINCCI POSADA DEL PATIO*****

The five-star Hotel Posada del Patio is located in the heart of Malaga. Its facilities include a rooftop swimming pool offering views of the city and a gourmet restaurant. The hotel is also home to the best preserved and most extensive section of the city's Moorish wall.

The luxurious Gran Hotel Miramar faces the sea, just ten metres from La Malagueta Beach. It is housed in a historic twentieth-century building, famous as the stomping ground of aristocracy and celebrities. It has three restaurants, a spa centre and two seasonal swimming pools.

PARADOR DE MÁLAGA GIBRALFARO****

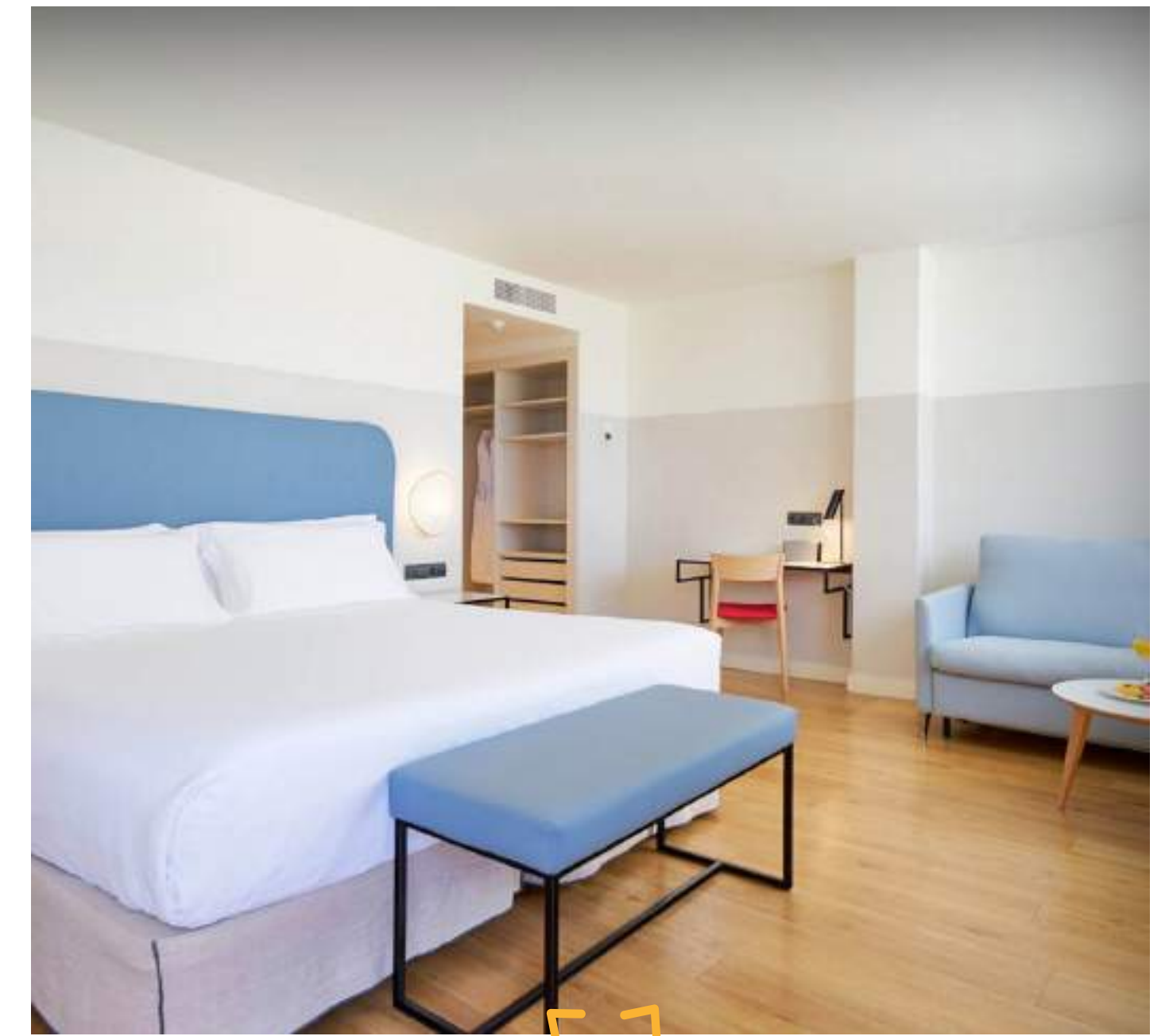
El Parador is located in Málaga's heart, beside the castle atop Gibralfaro mountain, offering magnificent views of the city and Mediterranean. Its rooftop terrace has a stunning swimming pool and solarium. El Parador's restaurant features traditional cuisine with innovative touches.

VALERIA ROOM MATE****

The stylish Room Mate Valeria is located 200 metres from Calle Larios, 300 metres from Malaga Cathedral and a 20-minute stroll from La Malagueta beach. Its rooms are designed by the renowned Melian Randolph studio. Its rooftop terrace with a swimming pool is stunning, offering breathtaking views of Malaga Port.

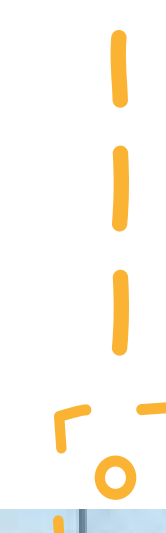

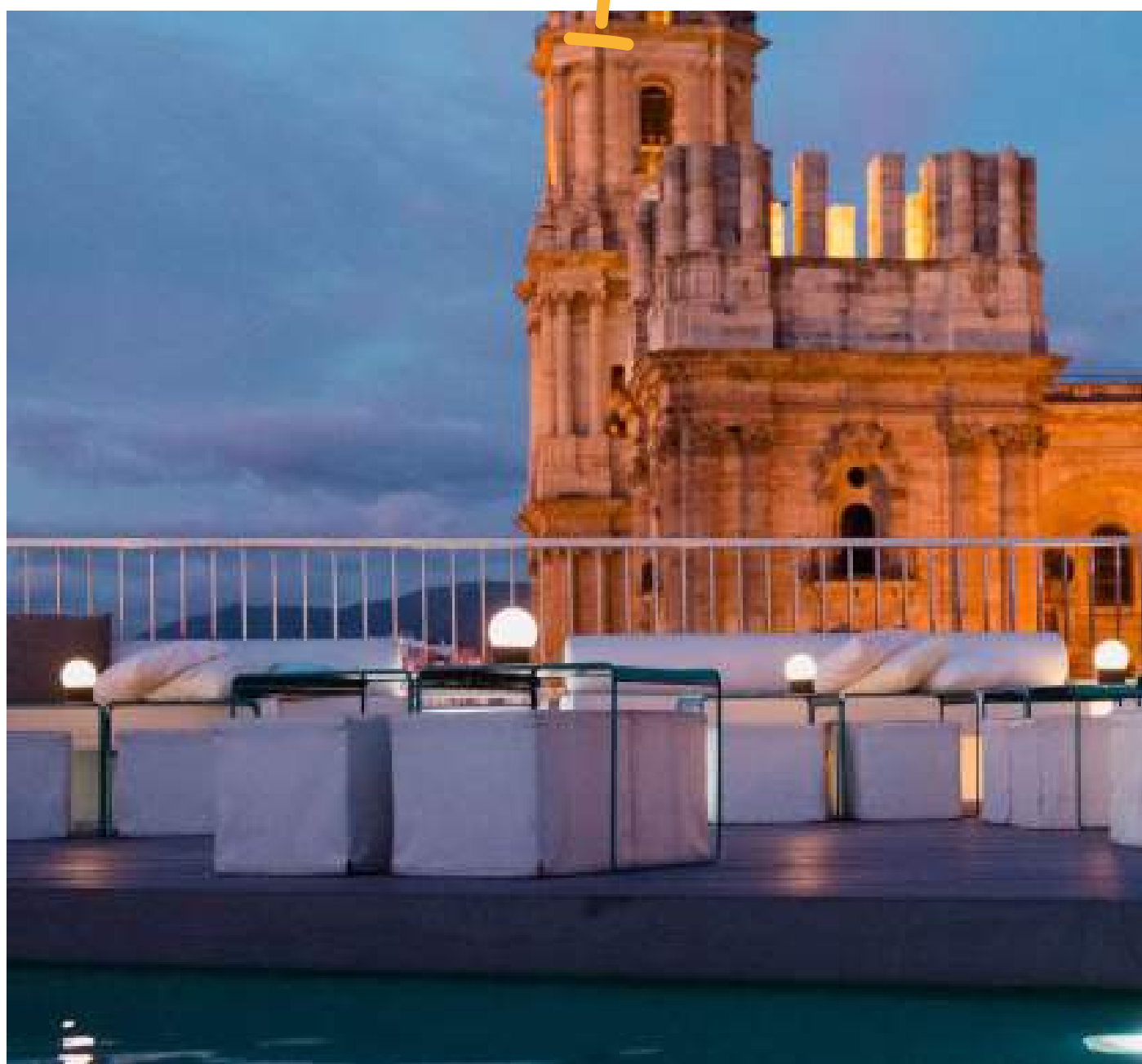

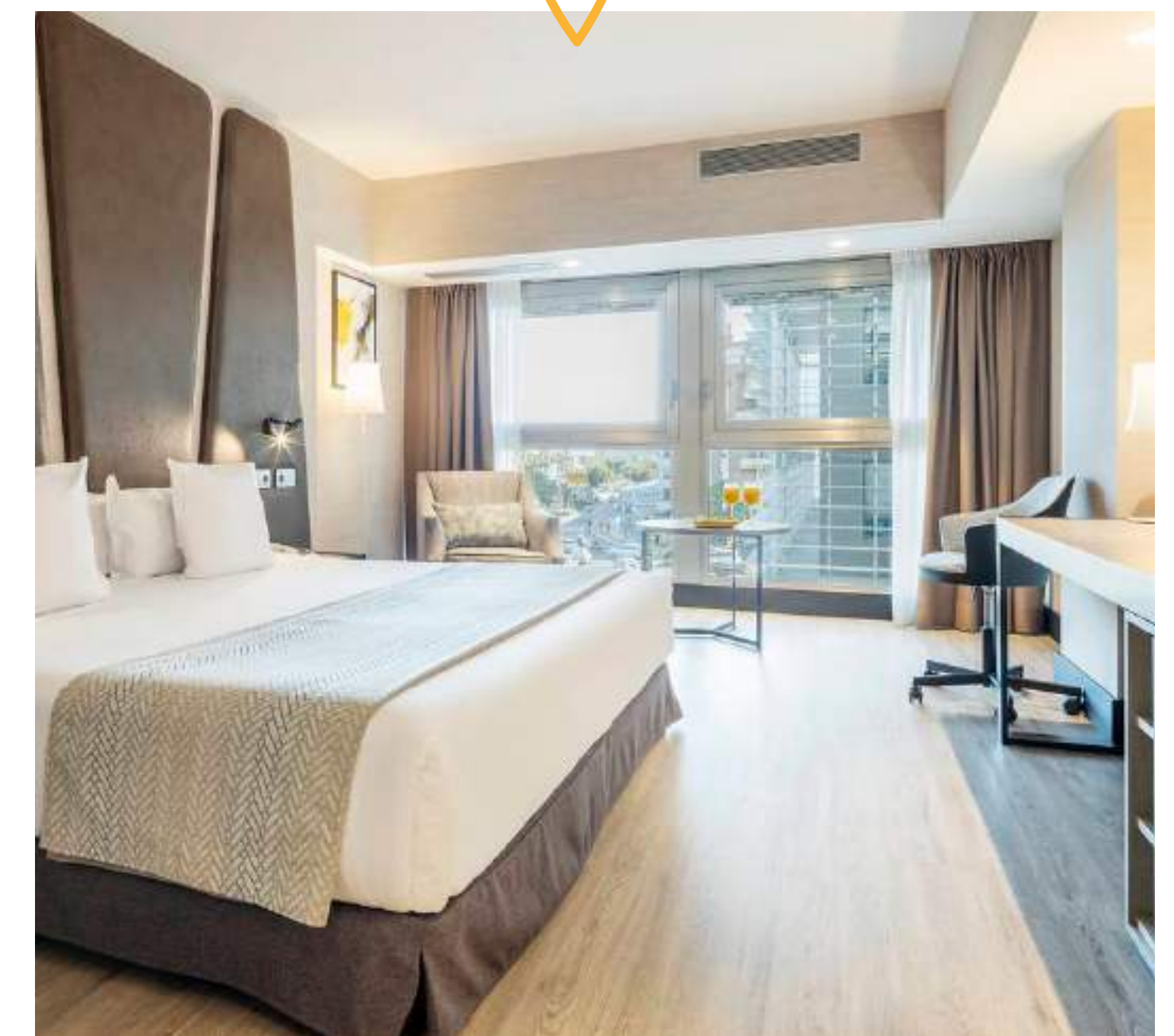


HOTEL MS MAESTRANZA****

HOTEL ILUNION****

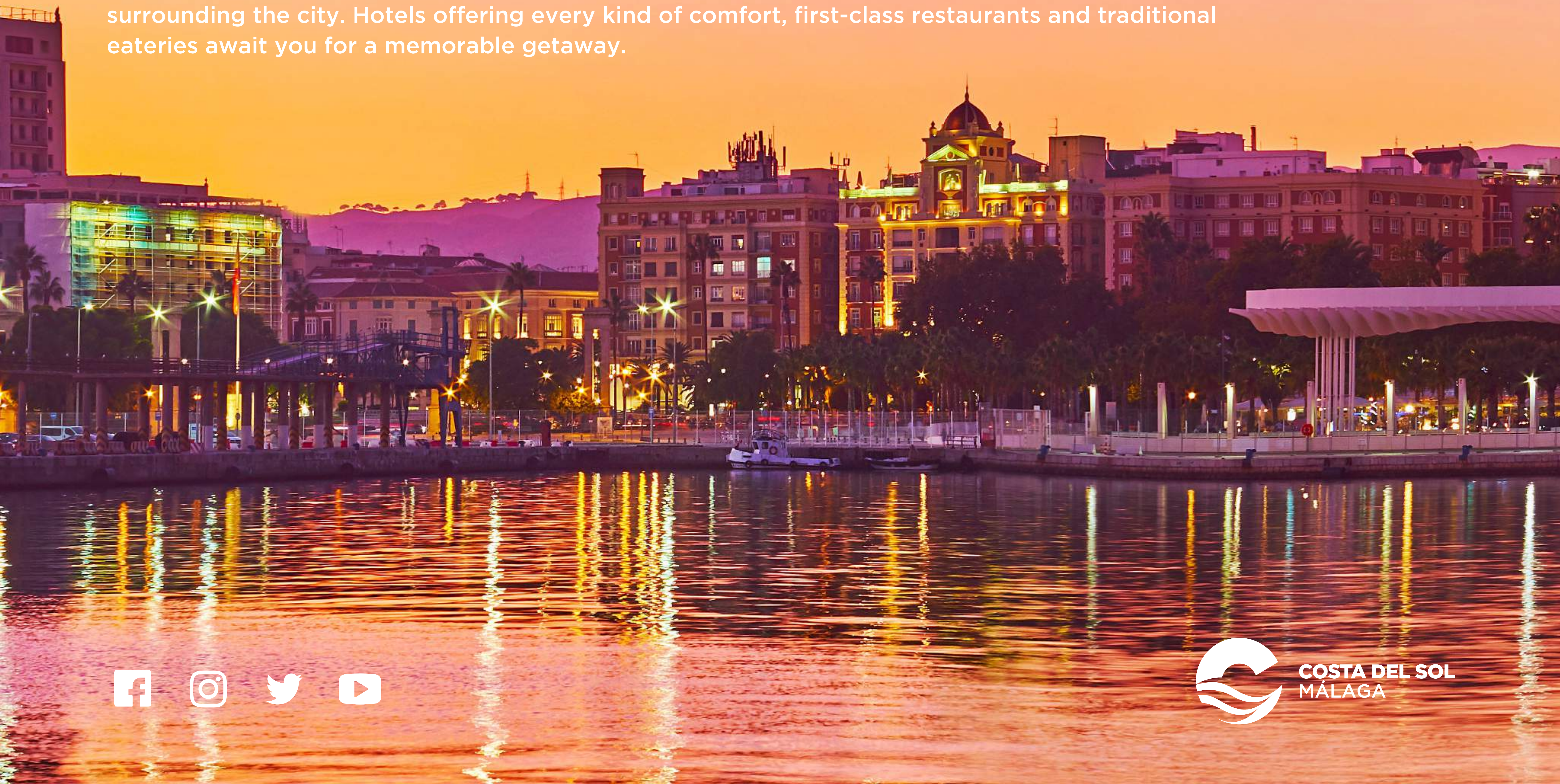
